"Speak Up! "A workshop on sex work and media relations

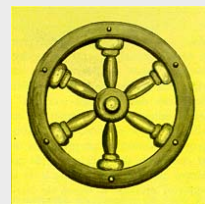

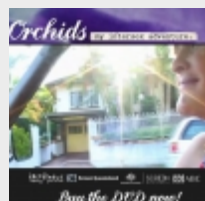

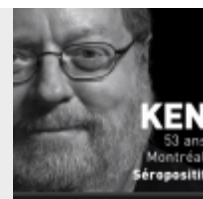

Funding the focus for public exhibition project

At the most recent general assembly (January 27, 2014), *Testimonial Cultures* project partners gave the green light to initial plans for a public exhibition (revised project proposal,

draft mandate for a working committee). Research undertaken thus far has been compiled into a report to assist with funding applications, a number of which have already been submitted or are currently being prepared (CANFAR; Faculté des sciences humaines de l'UQAM; Fonds de recherche du Québec (FRQSC); Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR)). Preparations for the exhibition project will continue this fall when we have the responses to these grant applications.

Videoqueer clips highlight queer resistance, resilience

A new set of six video clips has just been released on videoqueer.org. The vignettes explore the resilience and resistance of queer people in Montreal as they face the challenges and joys of collective organizing. Videoqueer is an initiative of Project 10 and *Radical Queer Semaine* with the goal of offering ways for young people of all sexual orientations and gender identities to organize and make their voices heard. Testimonials to the questions and issues being faced in communities, these video clips aim to promote collective action.

Scandal ! Sin, crime and morality in Montreal, 1940-1960: testimonials a key feature in new exhibition

Drawing from archival records and dozens of testimonials, this exhibition takes visitors through twenty years of history that made their mark on Montreal's political culture. Testimonials from the Chaire de recherche sur l'homophobie and the community organization Stella are among those included in the exhibition. With its culture of bars and cabarets, its "Red Light" district, and its many brothels and gambling halls, Montreal acquired the reputation of "sin city" during a period that was also particularly important for both sexual minorities and sex workers. The exhibition *Scandale! Vice, crime et moralité à Montréal, 1940-1960* continues until October 2015 at the Centre d'histoire de Montréal.
