Study Day on the conditions within which we produce our testimonials

Get ready to have an experience you'll long remember during the upcoming Study Day that will take place in Montreal on November 9th!

Barbara Legault, coordinator of the event, promises to get you talking and stimulate your brain cells during this festive day designed to foster solidarity in a context of open exchange.

The convergence of our testimonial practices as well as their diversity will be explored through plenary discussions, workshops, and informal exchanges, helped along by an energetic and interactive facilitation style. To broaden our horizons of thought and action, a

groovy "5 à 7" reception with DJ and performances is also in the works.

The overall goal of the event is to share our experiences, ideas and questions with regards to the production of testimonials as strategies for social and cultural intervention. Various topics will be up for discussion such as different types of testimonials, which media are used, practical tips, training tools, political challenges, the impact of giving testimonials, ethical issues, and more.

In the coming days, Barbara will be contacting project partners and collaborators to clarify your vision, discussion questions, and objectives for

the day. A detailed proposal for the program of activities will be presented and discussed during the General Assembly on October 9.

About 60 people are expected to participate in the Study Day, and each partner is encouraged to arrange for at least five members, volunteers or activists from your organization to attend. Registration (by invitation only) will start on October 12.

The event will take place in the meeting rooms of "Espace La Fontaine" in the heart of *Parc La Fontaine* – a bright and colourful place to spend the day together!

Testimonials in all shapes and sizes ...

Over the past year, we've compiled dozens of examples from the media and various types of artistic practice in order to document how testimonials are used by people from sexual and gender minorities, people living with HIV, and people with an experience in sex work.

Bruno Laprade recently undertook a preliminary

review and his findings show that this growing "corpus" of material is extremely diverse.

From soldiers to immigrants, from dominatrices to parents with transgender children, public testimonials have been given by a wide range of people using many different formats - podcasts, TV interviews, photo exhibits,

books, and more – in order to address a large number of topics: activism, love, criminalization, health, and sports, to name just a few.

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Deep in thought at the Sorbonne ...

Crossroads: a productive meeting place for new ideas

Three members of our study team presented a panel on the Testimonial Cultures project during the 9th edition of the *Crossroads in Cultural Studies* conference that took place at Université Sorbonne Nouvelle in Paris in July 2012.

Inspired by the conference's "crossroads" theme, the purpose of the panel was to present initial results from the project and enter into dialogue with other researchers and activists who share interests and goals similar to our own.

To this end, **Thomas Haig** gave an analysis of the methodological, ethical, and political issues and challenges that arose during the first year of the project.

Janik Bastien-Charlebois' presentation focused on the challenges of inclusivity that LGBTQI community groups face when using testimonials as a strategy for social change.

In conclusion, **María Nengeh Mensah** presented the first stages of a comparison of the testimonial cultures of people

living with HIV and people with an experience in sex work.

Team members also took part in a number of other formal and informal meetings during this busy international event, setting the stage for potential collaboration with partners in other countries in the future.

Application for ethical approval

We have recently submitted an application for ethical approval to UQAM's *Comité institutionnel d'éthique de la recherche avec des êtres humains*. This application will make it possible for the project team to conduct interviews with people who have given testimonials in the media as a member of a sexual or gender minority or as a sex worker.

Obtaining ethical approval will

not mean that we are required to undertake such interviews, but will ensure that ethical principles are respected in the event that we decide to go in this direction.

In particular, our approach is oriented by the principles of "shared authority" over the personal stories that are told in the context of a research interview. In this regard, we have benefited from guidance from Concordia's Centre for

Oral History and Digital Storytelling. From the perspective of such an approach, sexual and gender minorities are considered to be full collaborators and equal partners in a dialogue. Respect for these principles will be important both at the interview stage and at the analysis stage of the research to ensure that project partners participate in collective interpretation of the data and co-construction of knowledge.

Two new video compilations coming soon!

The production of two compilations of excerpts from Canadian film and video is proceeding apace under the coordination of **Véro Leduc**.

The first compilation will illustrate different ways in which testimonials have been used in connection with sex work, drawing on a range of film and video work produced in recent decades. Excerpts will

be selected to cut across a wide spectrum of themes and formats: speaking out, performance, direct action, advocacy, education, etc.

The second compilation, drawn from material produced between 2000 and 2012, will feature testimonials from a diverse range of people living with HIV that address a variety of topics

such as criminalization, anti-retroviral treatment, stigma, and human rights.

Both compilations will be completed and launched in DVD format within the next few months and will be useful in the context of various research and educational activities. They will also be made available on the Internet.

Dropbox makes collaboration easier

This past winter, we set up a collective work space on Dropbox (dropbox.com) that allows members of our partnership to consult and exchange documents related to the project using the Internet. At that time, you likely received one or more email messages inviting you to share folders that we created on Dropbox for this purpose.

This system helps reduce the exchange of documents by email by allowing us to archive and update project documentation in shared

"virtual" folders that each of us can easily access from our own computer. Whenever a file in Dropbox is added or updated, the changes are instantly saved for everyone else who shares the folder. It's as easy as pie!

Here's a brief overview of the folders that have been set up on Dropbox for our project:

- A "public" folder contains various non-confidential items (e.g. the *Newsletter*) and can be shared by anyone with an interest in the project.

- Other folders are reserved for a specific group (e.g. folders belonging to each working group; a partners' folder that contains a copy of the partnership agreement, etc.).
- Folders for the General Assembly and the Executive Committee allow participants to access a full archive of agendas and minutes from these meetings


New film on experiences of HIV-positive women

Call for submissions : *PolitiQueer* No. 1

If the emergence of queer theory dates back to the 1990s, queer analysis is still primarily undertaken within English-language contexts. Relatively little has been conceptualized, published, or translated into French. This new journal aims to expand the dissemination of queer thought in the French language. The first issue of *PolitiQueer*, "Dimensions francopholles," will focus on the specificity of queer francophone theories and communities (Quebec, France, Belgium, Switzerland, francophone Africa, DOM-TOM, etc..).

Submission formats: articles (35,000 to 50,000 characters), essays (minimum 15,000 characters), interviews, book reviews, literary and artistic contributions. If you have ideas to share but find it difficult to write in French, *PolitiQ* can provide editorial assistance. If you would like to give a testimonial about an experience rather than writing it down, *PolitiQ* can interview you and produce a transcription.
